Darran Callaghan, currently Headteacher at Holywell Primary School was successful in his interview and will be starting as Headteacher at Aylesham Primary School next term. Darran has been instrumental in developing our Trust and is a highly valued member of our Trust Leadership Team. Aylesham will be very lucky to have such a terrific leader and we very much hope to continue our collaboration with Darran in the future.

LOUD AND PROUD AT BRIARY! SCHOOL COUNCIL ATTEND CHILDREN'S FORUM

Over 100 School Council representatives from across the Whitstable and Herne Bay infant, junior, primary and secondary schools came together to listen to guest speakers who talked about the cost of living crisis and the impact this was having on the local community. One of the speakers was from the Canterbury Foodbank who described how schools could help to support them.



In smaller groups, the children and young people generated ideas of what could be done in individual schools to help. These ideas were collated and the most popular ones identified to propose to the next meeting of Headteachers. Of the three children chosen to make the proposal, two came from Briary! Sophie and Harrison in Year 6 explained the proposal from the Children's Forum:

- A fund-raising event in each school
- · Promotion of the Foodbank App in each school
- Devoting a storage space in each school for collecting donations for the foodbank
- Their pitch was so convincing that the Headteachers agreed unanimously.

Sophie said "It was quite a daunting experience to talk in front of all those adults but I was proud to be there representing Briary and the School Councils"

The Briary Choir were very excited to be representing the school for the first time at the Young Voices Concert at the O2 Arena in January. YEAR 6 HISTORY PROJECT PUBLISHED

Finding The Fallen was a local history investigation carried out by the pupils from Year 6. Set up to commemorate the centenary of the first Remembrance in 1922 and run by Neil Tonge of 'Horrible Histories' fame, our pupils learnt about different aspects of World War One and the impact on the local community. ART DAYS

We began this term by participating in two whole school art days. The focus for the days was to explore painting, in particular colour. Every class explored an artist who has specialised in painting.

As well as this, the children built on their prior knowledge of painting and different mediums were used across the year groups. The children all learnt new skills, that they were able to apply to their final



piece of art work, which was inspired by their artists. A wonderful creative two days was had by all, and the artwork which was produced was to a high standard. A piece has been chosen from each class to be framed and displayed in the school.

On Monday 23rd January, we took part in activities to celebrate Chinese New Year. We shared a Chinese lunch together too. This day was full of joy and wonder as the children took part in different activities from: a virtual author visit, Chinese flag making, constructing Chinese lanterns, baking biscuits and paper cutting a rabbit.

ECO-SCHOOLS

At Palm Bay we have an Eco-Committee made up of a group of children representing all of the KS2 year groups that are divided into 6 teams. The Eco-Committee have been busy carrying out official tasks such as the Environmental review and creating the action plan along with leading phase assemblies to encourage every member of the school to make an eco-pledge in a small way that they can make a difference.



The different teams have been busy ensuring that recycling is collected; fruit and vegetable waste is composted; lights and appliances are turned off; litter is picked up and the outside planters are kept weed free. In addition to this, we have our YELs (Young Environmental Leaders) who, in collaboration with Turner Contemporary, have embarked on an exciting new project linking environmental issues and art. They have already created a colourful litter picking station that is now in the school playground, and are planning other projects including an art installation using recycled materials.

Working in this way means that more pupils, their families and the wider community can be included, we can maintain our Green Flag status and we can continue our journey to become even more environmentally aware.

LIVING HISTORIES

This term, Year 3 took part in a Living Histories Stone Age workshop designed to encourage children to consider the relationship between technological advancement and lifestyle. They took part in a variety of activities designed to piece together the past using evidence and Experimental Archaeology including all the children dressing up in costumes and make-up, taking part in drama and re-enactment, and making their own tools which they could then take away as souvenirs.





BIKEABILITY

The Year 6 children have been taking part in Bikeability training this term. As part of the national initiative the children have been learning practical skills and have been helped to understand how to cycle on today's roads. Qualified, expert instructors have supported the children to build the confidence needed to cycle when moving to secondary school and to enjoy cycling into later life.

We have many budding Astronauts and Astronomers now, who left the day inspired and ready to soar back up into space!


